

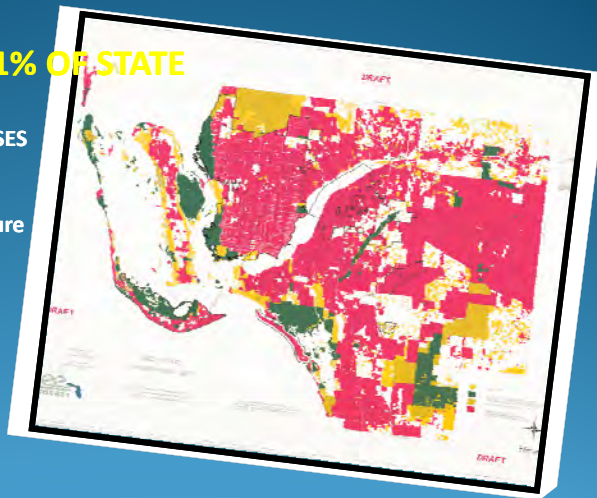


8% OF LEE COUNTY set aside for open space/conservation

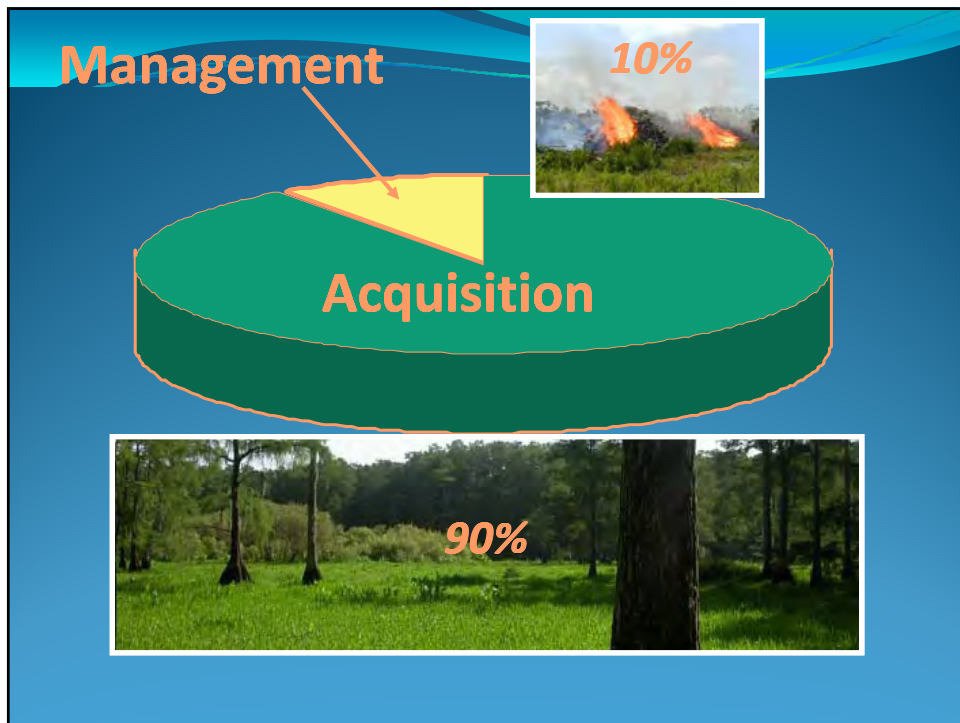
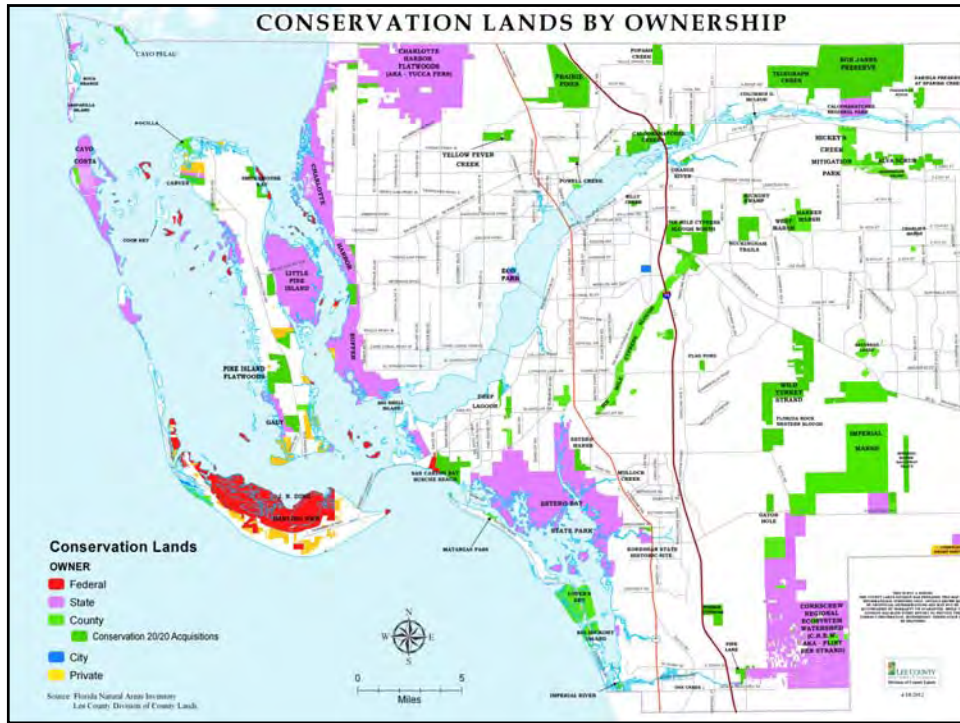

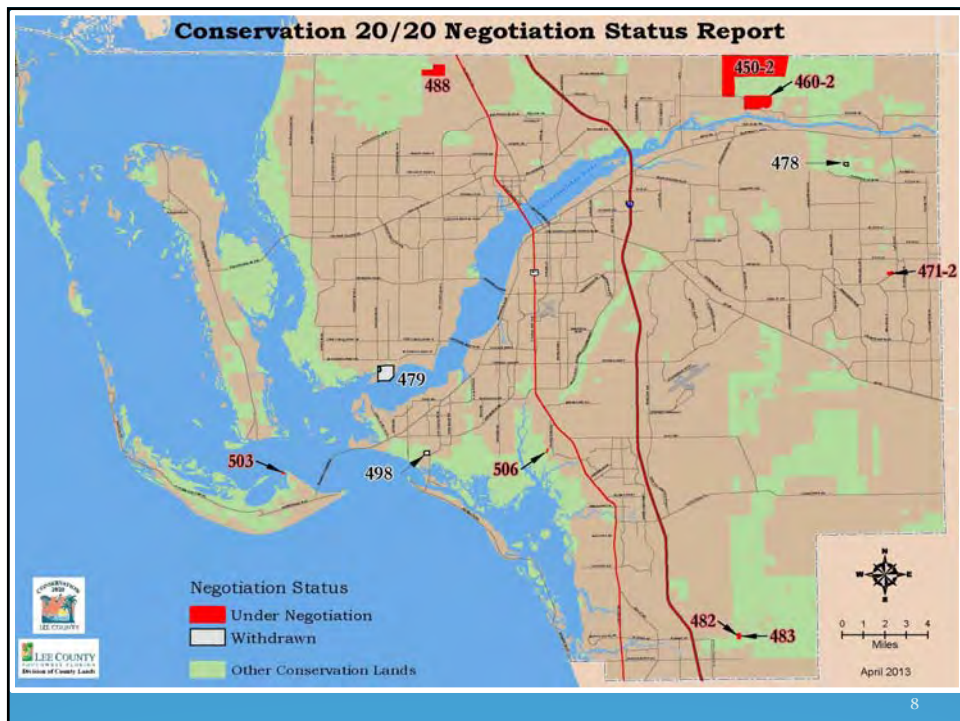

Lee County General Fund Shortfall Reduction Scenarios

Scenario #1 - Cuts only, including a 5.6% decrease for Sheriff.

Scenario #2 - EMS rate adjustment (1/3 step) and reduced cuts for Sheriff (3.5%) and Partnering for Results.

Scenario #3 - Temporary millage redistribution (3 years only), EMS rate adjustment (1/3 step), elimination of some cuts, including Sheriff.

Scenario #4 - Temporary millage redistribution (3 years only), EMS rate adjustment (2/3), elimination of some cuts, including Sheriff.

Scenario #5 - Millage increase, EMS rate adjustment (2/3 step), franchise fees increase, elimination of some cuts, including Sheriff.
